

Alaska Highway Road Log

The engineering marvel of the Second World War, and major adventure road leading to the [Yukon](#) and [Alaska](#). To many, this trip represents a lifetime of planning and thought, while to others it is an annual journey. Whether this is your first time or you're a seasoned traveller of the highway, we hope the following information will be an asset. Stretching 2,288 km/1422 miles from [Dawson Creek, British Columbia](#) to [Delta Junction Alaska](#). The highway is mostly paved in Canada and all paved in Alaska.

From Dawson Creek, the Alaska highway extends almost 968 km/595 miles to Lower Post where it enters the [Yukon](#). The highway winds through the Yukon for about 885 km/550 miles and crosses into Alaska at mile 1221/km 1964. Continuing on to Delta Junction at mile 1422/km 2288, the Alaska Highway joins the [Richardson Highway](#) for the remaining 98 miles/158 km to [Fairbanks AK](#).

km 34/mile 21.1 Loop Road on right northbound leads to Kiskatinaw Provincial Park. 5 km. 28 camp sites, water, firewood, tables and fishing. Camping fee. Rejoins highway at mile 16.2/km 26

km 48/mile 29.8 Brake check and parking on both sides of highway at top of hill overlooking the Peace River.

km 49.8/mile 30.9(HM 33) Parking with view of Peace River Valley.

km 55/mile 34.2 [Taylor Landing Provincial Park](#). Picnic tables and boat launch.

km 55.5/mile 34.5 Peace River Bridge. 712 meters

km 57/mile 35.4 (HM 36) Taylor. Population 1200. Gas, groceries, accommodations, post office, restaurants. Nestled on the banks of the majestic Peace River, Taylor offers a wide variety of recreation and amenities. A \$40 million natural gas scrubbing plant & oil refinery are here at the beginning of a 700-mile natural gas pipeline which supplies Vancouver & western Washington.

km 79.5/mile 49.4-Beaton Provincial Park, 8 km side road. 37 camp sites.

km 87.5/mile 54.4-Junction with Highway 29. Alternate all-paved route to Chetwynd on Highway 97, and the town of Hudson's Hope. The 600-ft. high dam across the Peace River valley forms the 640-square mile Williston Lake, the largest lake in BC.

Peace Canyon visitors center at the Peace Canyon Hydroelectric Project. 5 km/3 miles south of Hudson's Hope on Highway 29, call 250-783-9943.

Hudson's Hope has a museum, information center, Lions Park Campground with log kitchen, toilets, dump station.

km 116/mile 72-The Shepherd's Inn, clean modern rooms, restaurant and dining room, local crafts and gifts, excellent campground with full hook-ups and pull through sites, clean showers. km 458/mile 284 to km 468/mile 291 Old Alaska Highway loop road rejoins the Alaska Highway at km 468. Also access to Poplar Hills Golf Course - 9 holes, driving range, open daily.

km 483.5/mile 300.4 Highway 77, Liard Highway to Fort Simpson and Fort Liard in the Northwest Territories joins the Mackenzie Highway at km 394/mile 245. It is a good gravel highway. The highway was officially opened in June of 1984. Check current road conditions at the Visitor Infocenters in [Fort Nelson BC](#) or Fort Simpson, NWT. Gas is limited with facilities at Fort Liard at 170 km/105 miles and at 394 km/245 mile junction of MacKenzie Highway.

km 698.5/mile 434 (HM 456) Double "G" Service.

km 700/mile 435 Muncho Lake. Accommodations, gas, campgrounds, groceries, boats and motors, fishing tackle all found along 7-mile section of road that skirts shoreline. Lake trout, whitefish, grayling and burbot. June is the best month for trolling with red and white spoons. Fishing is good near the small island at north end of lake. Stone sheep, goats, moose, caribou and grizzlies abound in area.

Muncho Lake, Alaska Highway, 250-776-3411. Motel, restaurant, camping, showers and dump station. RV repairs, gas & oil products, diesel.

Muncho Lake is one of the most beautiful lakes in British Columbia and the best way to see it is aboard the 32' Sandpiper. Enjoy a one hour narrated tour about the natural history of Muncho Lake and area.

km 764/mile 474.7 Liard Lodge, visitor facilities.

km 765/mile 476 [Liard River Hot Springs Provincial Park](#), water, toilets, firewood and day-use area. Natural hot springs, bathing pools, change houses at both pools, boardwalk connecting both pools, amphitheater, playground, horseshoe pits, wheelchair accessible. Enjoy a walk along the boardwalk to the mineral pools. This is a very busy park during the summer. Visitors are warned to watch for signs of bear. Store food in your car or in the food cache.

km 912/mile 566.7 (HM 590) Contact Creek Lodge. Phone/fax 867 536-2262. Cafe, camping with electric hook-ups, ice and BC & Yukon fishing licenses, and T-shirts. Tires, minor repairs, 24 hour towing, and souvenirs. Pressure car wash.

km 937/mile 582.2 Hyland River, parking at north end of bridge. Fishing.

km 958/mile 595.3 Lower Post, BC 1 km/.6 mile side road). Pop. 150, elevation 1,925 ft., was an early-day Hudson's Bay Company trading outpost.

The British Columbia government has replaced the kilometre posts in their section of the Alaska Highway. The Yukon has decided not to re-number their kilometre posts until all construction work is complete. There is 40 km discrepancy between km 967 and km 1008 at the BC/Yukon border.

(HM 804)-Teslin. Population 480, elevation 701 m/2300 ft.

[Nisutlin Trading Post](#) has a little bit of everything. Motel rooms with satellite TV and phones. Groceries, bakery, fresh produce, soft ice-cream and dairy as well as hardware, camping gear, fishing tackle and licenses. They have an ATM machine and a pay phone. Things to Do

[The George Johnston Museum](#) is located on the Alaska Highway, 1 km west of the Nisutlin Bay Bridge. It is named after a venerated Tlingit elder trapper, fur trader, entrepreneur and photographer. Through his photographs and colorful exhibits of traditional Tlingit regalia and artifacts you experience the story of the Inland Tlingit. The store is stocked with furs, Tlingit art and other intriguing Yukon souvenirs.

km 1345/mile 835.8 [Canol Road](#) Junction (Yukon Highway 6). Side road leads 210 km/130 miles to town of Ross River. 96 km/60 miles to campground at Quiet Lake (good fishing). No travel facilities between here and Ross River. This road parallels the \$130-million Canada Oil pipeline which carried oil to [Whitehorse](#) over 600 miles from 60 producing wells near the Arctic Circle. Check road conditions locally.

The refuge was primarily set aside because of its unique waterfowl habitat. It has one of the highest densities of nesting waterfowl in Alaska, and in favorable years produces about 100,000 ducklings to flight stage. As a migration corridor for all types of birds entering and leaving Alaska, the refuge provides habitat for 143 nesting species of birds and 47 migrants.

Big game animals include moose, caribou, Dall's sheep, grizzly bear, black bear and wolf. Other mammals include wolverine, lynx, marten, otter, red fox, beaver, muskrat, snowshoe hare and mink.

Arctic grayling, burbot, lake trout, northern pike and whitefish are present in refuge lakes and streams. No significant salmon runs reach this far inland.

As one of the only two road-connected Alaskan refuges, Tetlin has the unique opportunity of reaching nearly all the visitors who travel to the state via the Alaska Highway. Visitors from all over the United States and many foreign countries pass along Tetlin's northern boundary every year. This gives the refuge an outstanding opportunity to provide interpretation about Alaskan habitats and the National Wildlife Refuge System. To meet this challenge, the refuge is an active participant in the Alaska Public Lands Information Center in Tok, and has a visitor reception center with interesting display at mile 1229.
